Police pump up efforts on petrol thieves

A POLICE crackdown has led Geelong officers to investigate more reports of petrol theft from local service stations in the past 12 months than in the eight years prior.

A Geelong-led pilot program that sees police actively investigate all reports of petrol theft has reaped such promising results it will be rolled out across the state.

Geelong Divisional Intelligence Unit Sergeant David Campbell said since the August 2017 launch of the trial local police had spoken to all petrol service workers to ensure they called triple-0 after the theft of fuel.

He said police had recorded a 240 per cent rise in Greater Geelong petrol drive-offs in the 12 months to June this

The huge surge, in which offences rose from 171 to 599 in a year, made Geelong the state's top location for fuel

"We took a hit statistically but that figure has now plateaued from 70 to 100 petrol thefts a month to 30 or 40," Sgt Campbell said. It follows years of concern from industry leaders, including APCO director Peter Anderson, after Victoria Police changed its policy in 2013 to treat petrol theft as a civil mat-

In June the force reversed its policy, a move it says will increase the number of fuel thefts being investigated but will assist police in prosecuting other criminality and repeat offenders.

"We started the pilot back in August 2017 and we saw a massive surge in petrol theft,

but that was basically because of encouraged reporting," Sgt Campbell said.

The shift in police response was sparked by a realisation that the majority of petrol thieves were recidivist offences driving stolen cars to commit other crimes.

"We saw the vehicle as an enabler to other crimes," Sgt Campbell said.

"It's a bit of a funnel effect — petrol stations are equipped with CCTV, usually good CCTV, capturing people on lots of different angles. We can get information about the offenders, descriptions of vehicles.

"Yes we have a surge in petrol theft, but associated crimes and linked crimes are dropping."

Sgt Campbell said the pilot program had led to improved information sharing and better cross-unit police coordination that had lowered offending.

Mr Anderson said recent police response had been "terrific".

"The petrol thieves are

going to come under real pressure, these people are committing an offence and they will be tracked," Mr Anderson

"It's something that APCO has lobbied hard for. We were very disappointed with the previous policy because it basically supported crime."

The State Government, police, service station owners and Crime Stoppers have teamed up to establish an education campaign urging the public to dob in offenders.

Anti-theft messaging will be displayed at petrol stations that have high prevalence of fuel theft including Geelong.
